Eleven Week Schedule

Course Objective: An entry-level course designed to familiarize the student with marker pens, various papers and techniques. Not geared to integrate perspective with the learning of markers rendering; traced photos will be used.

Summary: Upon successful completion of the course, the Student will have been exposed to a range of marker techniques and papers along with self-critiquing tricks to assist them in presenting to clients the ideas of design.

Attendance: Each student may have a total of two absences. However, more than two consecutive class meeting absences or three non-consecutive meeting absences per course may result in the student being withdrawn from that course. Attendance is considered an important habit to acquire in becoming a mature, responsible member of the professional community.

Projected Class Schedule:

- Week 1 Introduction to markers, pens, pencils, papers and other tools of rendering.
Demonstrations of various techniques, marker handling and papers. Simple volume making using a cube, cylinder and sphere.
Text: pages 2 through 31. Take note of the diagram on page 18 and complete version page 20. Your assignment may vary from illustrations shown in the book. DO NOT isolate with a black pen as illustrated in the text.
- Homework:** Four of each shape (16 minimum) approx. 2" x 2" each, three sheets max. 16 shapes, grading for LMD's
16 Geometric Shapes (Cube, Sphere, Cylinder and Cone) with Light, Medium, Dark
Cube: One pen/ One pen + grey/Two pens/ Combination choice - 1 as open box
Sphere: One pen/One pen + cool grey/ Two pens/Combination choice - One disc
Cylinder: Two cool Greys/Two warm greys/Two pens/One pen - One as "tube"
Cone: Two pens/One pen/One pen + grey/Combination choice - One pleated
- Week 2 Post on wall for oral critique of homework DUE.
DUE Review of lay-in techniques. Demonstration of lay-in's for shape definition (viz., stripes)
Homework: Four replications of chairs in solids using LMD.
Line Drawing (chair): **LMD**
Solid or alternate fabric, either plaid, stripe or floral print. Bring fabric for drawing comparison and apply to chair
Additional: Select photos of textures, which begin next week.
Text: pages 32 through 41. Your assignment may vary from illustrations shown in the book, however the chair is the same as illustrated.
- Week 3 Post on wall for oral critique of homework DUE. Chairs with LMD's
DUE Begin textural materials by free-hand or trace drawing.
Various papers may be utilized as well as mixed medias (three papers minimum exploration over duration of course).
Homework Part One: Four illustrations on one sheet of paper
Materials: Trace four samples, two (2) stone and two (2) wood. Of the stone, one is polished and one is honed/matt in surface finish. Of the woods, one light and one dark. See text page 42-44; label pens used for future reference.
Homework Part Two: Now apply the same textures into micro renderings. See text pages 45 to 49. Best approach is to create small vignettes, perspectives, and insert two to five textures per micro-rendering One dozen examples of textures (each approximately 2" x 2"). Textures (16 variations) 12 minimum
Select a minimum of 12 items from each of the following fields:
Stone: Flamed granite, polished granite, dark marble, slate in 12" X 12" sq pavers
Clay: 4"X4" ceramic tile, Mexican clay pavers, brick (new or used)
Wood: Oak (red or white), Mahogany (may have a cherry stain) Ash or Birch

Glass: 3/4" beveled glass table top, framed mirror, floor-to-ceiling mirror, glass picture frame.

Text: pages 42 through 51.

Week 4 Post on wall for oral critique of homework DUE
Demonstration of sofa lay-in's and rendering of materials used for project.
Project One begins bringing together each of the various techniques.
Refresher of Perspective I (See Smartbook 1, pages 58 – 65).
Homework: Complete Project One Sofa and log hours required. Traced Line Drawing (sofa) for Light, Medium & Dark, plus beginning Textures (wood, marble, stone on floors) and color on the walls. Detail for distance, nearness employing one only patterned floral, plaid or stripe. Text shows a composite sample, your submission will be ONE textile
Text: pages 54 through 73.

Week 5 Post on wall for oral critique of homework DUE
Demonstration of sofa lay-in's and rendering of materials used for project.
Project One begins bringing together each of the various techniques.
Refresher of Perspective I (See Smartbook 1, pages 58 – 65).
Homework: Complete Project One Sofa and log hours required. Traced Line Drawing (sofa) for Light, Medium & Dark, plus beginning Textures (wood, marble, stone on floors) and color on the walls. Detail for distance, nearness employing one only patterned floral, plaid or stripe. Text shows a composite sample, your submission will be ONE textile
Text: pages 54 through 73.

Week 6 **Project One Due** Post original on wall for oral critique
Obtain color copy **after** class critique/ your modifications; turn-in color copy only, which may be accompanied by grade sheet. Copy will not be returned.
Begin **Project Two** using the same sofa Traced Line Drawing (sofa) for patterns, textures, and textiles with Light, Medium & Dark Evening lighting (lamp), second fabric (stripe, plaid, floral), polish flooring. Glass table (coffee table) with sketched article on top.
Text: pages 73 through 81

Week 7 **Project Two – original pin-up** at beginning of outset of class. Oral Critique
DUE Studio presentation of airbrush and further mixed media techniques. Bristol board or Bond paper to be utilized

Week 8 Begin Project Three Studio time with demonstrations as required for techniques on student work in progress. Same traced Line Drawing (sofa, practice makes perfect) as exercise using all previous techniques with base shadowing and a window covering in matching fabric (taut vs pleated): Light, Medium & Dark; Textures (wood, marble, stones); Third remaining un-worked textile to be used for both taut and pleated (not the same as Project One or Two)
Text: pages 82 through 98

Week 9
DUE **Project Three Due** – Post on wall for Oral Critique. Sketching in color and rapid visualization techniques, time permitting
Begin Project Four using a photo to be traced, a MINOR amount only please, onto Bristol board (Alternate course requisite is possible with permission)
Text: pages 99 through 103, you may enlarge the studies in the rear of the text for preparatory practice for final 75-90 minute study.

Week 10 Project Four development onto Bristol board (Alternate course requisite is possible with permission)

DUE **Project Four Due** at beginning of class with oral instructor critique followed by a NFG speed project.

Detail for distance, nearness
Floral, plaid or stripe
- 20 **Project Two**
Traced Line Drawing (sofa) for pattern, texture and prints with Light, Medium & Dark
Evening lighting (lamp), second fabric (stripe, plaid, floral), polish flooring. Glass table
(coffee table)
- 20 **Project Three**
Traced Line Drawing (sofa or approved photo) as exercise using all previous techniques
with base shadowing and a window covering in matching fabric (taught vs pleated):
Light, Medium & Dark; Textures (wood, marble, stones); Pattern, print, plaid or stripe
